Eco-friendly Moving



The average American moves 11.4 times in their lifetime, and with each move a large amount of belongings are discarded. Consider donating or recycling these items, instead.

When it comes time to pack belongings, look at things you own that can be used as a substitute for a cardboard box. Items such as plastic bins, dresser drawers, crates, suitcases, and laundry baskets make good packing containers. If you need more packing containers, consider used cardboard boxes. This will reuse boxes that are otherwise discarded as trash or recycling.

Packaging materials such as bubble wrap and packing peanuts are not always recyclable. Consider using towels, clothing, bedding and pillows as packing material. Newspaper can be used, and then later recycled. Every choice we make has an impact on the environment.



TV Recycling

Televisions are accepted for e-waste recycling at the Corral Farm facility only, Monday through Saturday. The disposal fees for televisions vary, depending on factors such as size, weight, and condition.

- Small TVs that are easily lifted by one person are \$15
- “Broken” TVs (exposed glass, wiring or sharp plastic edges) are \$25
- Large TVs that require more than one person to lift (projector screen TVs, TVs over 100 lbs.) are \$35

Payment is accepted by check or cash only.

Landfill Wildlife on Instagram

In the May Wasteline newsletter, a photo showed the nest of a Wilson’s Plover, from the Corral Farm site. Many types of wildlife call Corral Farm home, especially in the spring when many animals have young. Deer, foxes, wild turkeys, Canada geese, box turtles, Eastern Ratsnakes, five-lined skinks and many other native and migratory species are found around the facility.
