As we look back on another year of service, I am both amazed and humbled by the deputies that wear the badge every day and our civilian personnel who equally serve with passion. I am encouraged by their dedication and commitment to improving our community.

I am reminded every day of the hardships experienced by our residents whom we are called to protect and serve. We are effective because of the relationships we have built and continue to build with our community and I am grateful for the outpouring of support we receive from the people who live, work, and visit this great county.

As we continue to learn and grow, I am thrilled to see relationships thrive with community stakeholders and surrounding law enforcement organizations throughout the region. These relationships will continue to enhance our ability to ensure school safety, combat the opioid crisis and provide awareness about the evils of sex-trafficking.

In the summer of 2018, we hosted an on-site assessment with the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission (VLEPSC). As part of this voluntary process, our sheriff's office's staff, facilities, and policies were evaluated on our compliance with over 190 different standards and best practices. As a result, we were awarded initial Law Enforcement Accreditation, with no waivers and no files needing either minor or major repair for over 700 proofs of compliance, which is the highest level bestowed to a law enforcement organization. This accomplishment marked our induction into a professional law enforcement organization in the top 25% of law enforcement agencies in the Commonwealth of Virginia.



Throughout the year your sheriff's office has been involved in community events, town halls, neighborhood and civic association meetings intended to continue the development and nurture healthy communications between your sheriff's office and the people we serve. Through community feedback and ongoing specialized training, your sheriff's office continues to evolve in providing the utmost in law enforcement services in a modern and rapidly-changing environment. This is a continual process and our current standing as a leader in community-minded law enforcement is a culmination of almost 260 years of progress. As we continue forward and look to the future, it is with great pleasure that I present this Annual Report to you as our symbolic pledge to uphold our core values – Honor, Professionalism, Compassion and Accountability.

In Memory of Our Fallen

Sergeant Charles Ebert Murray, Jr.

End of Watch: Monday, July 9, 1990

Sergeant Charles Murray was killed when his unmarked patrol car was struck by an Amtrak passenger train at an ungated crossing on Eustace Rd. He was enroute to serve a warrant at the time of the crash. Sergeant Murray had served with the Fauquier County Sheriff's Office for 10 years. He was survived by his wife, parents, and sister.



Deputy Sheriff John Henry Walter

End of Watch: Wednesday, July 5, 1972

Deputy Sheriff John Henry Walter was killed in an automobile accident while enroute to Richmond, Virginia, with another deputy. The other deputy attempted to pass a vehicle on Route 17 and struck another vehicle head-on, killing Deputy Walter instantly. The deputy's vision was obstructed at the time because of heavy rain.

Sergeant John Holcombe Woodson

End of Watch: Monday, August 5, 1946

Sergeant John Holcombe Woodson was shot and killed in Catlett, Virginia, as he and another railroad detective approached a man to question him about freight thefts. Before the detectives even spoke to the man, he produced a .22 caliber handgun and opened fire. One of the shots struck Sergeant Woodson in the neck, mortally wounding him. He was transported to Warrenton Hospital where he succumbed to the wound. The suspect fled but was later arrested. He was subsequently convicted of murder and executed. Sergeant Woodson had served with the Southern Railroad Police Department for 31 years. He was survived by his wife.





In Memory of Our Fallen



The Fauquier County Sheriff's Office had the honor of hosting the Annual Memorial Service on May 15, 2018 recognizing fallen local law enforcement officers. Members from the Fauquier County Sheriff's Office, Warrenton Police Department, and Fauquier Board of Supervisors gathered to remember the services of those fallen, and extend gratitude to their families.





Accreditation



What is Accreditation?

An accredited agency is distinguished as an agency that follows an established set of professional standards and guidelines which measure performance in their service to the community, the criminal justice industry and their agency personnel. It is a process of adopting and following the best practices in service that can be provided.



After taking office as the 60th Sheriff of Fauquier County, Sheriff Bob Mosier signed on to the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission (VLEPSC) in January 2016 to become an applicant agency and begin the self-assessment phase. In just over two years, the Fauquier County Sheriff's Office underwent a final assessment. For three days in June 2018 law enforcement assessors from the VLEPSC commission inspected every aspect of the Sheriff's Office operations. After reviewing the VLSPSC established 190 standards and over 700 individual FCSO provided proofs of compliance for those standards, the Fauquier County Sheriff's Office passed with a perfect score! There were no waivers to any of the 190 standards provided by the commission and no minor and no major discrepancies found during the assessment. The Fauquier County Sheriff's Office was awarded initial accreditation at the Commission meeting in Fairfax, VA on August 9, 2018.

Fauquier County Sheriff's Office is proud to meet the accreditation standards which will ensure the professional services we provide are defined and uniform and streamlines operations, providing a more effective deployment of agency resources.



Adult Detention Center





The Fauquier County Adult Detention Center (ADC) is responsible for the safe and secure housing of all individuals incarcerated by the respective courts of Fauquier County. The facility had an average daily population of 80, during the 2018 calendar year. We remain affiliated with the Northwestern Regional Adult Detention Center in Winchester, VA, where local inmates are also housed to decrease overcrowding.

Fauquier County Sheriff’s Office is proud to partner with *Spiritworks* to provide a peer to peer based rehabilitation program called “Recovery Behind the Walls.” This program focuses on intense education and group support to individuals battling addiction of all kinds, along with peer to peer counseling by recovering addicts who are certified by the Department of Behavioral Health and Development Services.

Electronic Commissary deposits, and the “*Homewav*” Electronic Video Visitation system, were put in place in 2018. The “*Homewav*” system allows inmates and their family and friends to visit either on-site, or remotely by using secure electronic means. This service is not only a convenience to the inmate population, but is cost-effective where personnel were traditionally committed to in-person, or non-contact visitations. Expenses for the use of equipment, and calls received and sent are at the expense of the inmate, not Fauquier County tax payers.



Court Security & Civil Process



Courts & Civil Highlights:

- 28 “Wanted Person of the Week” Apprehended
- 17 “10 Most Wanted” Apprehended

The Civil Process/Court Security Division maintains responsibilities for the execution and service of legal documents, warrant service, fugitive apprehension, and the security of three courthouses. The Division is approved for a staff of 26 full time deputies, 2 part-time temporary deputies, 1 full-time and 1 part-time permanent administrative associate.

Court Security deputies provided security screenings to 194,451 people entering the court houses while managing operations related to Grand Jury, Special Grand Jury, and Jury Trials. Deputies supervised movements of 1,687 inmates for court appearances. Deputies fingerprinted 227 defendants and collected DNA samples of 7 defendants.



Civil Process also does Public Fingerprinting. Last year in 2018 1,182 prints were taken by request.

Criminal Investigations



CID Highlights:

Criminal Investigations Division (CID), is responsible for investigating major crimes, specializing in homicides, violent crimes, crimes against persons/children, property crimes, fire investigations and serious misdemeanor crimes.

CID also houses the Crime Analyst, who is responsible for information sharing, and intelligence gathering.

CID has four detectives dedicated specifically to a Special Operations Unit (SOU), that handles narcotic and gang investigations targeting ongoing criminal activity. Two of those detectives are also K-9 handlers. Three of the SOU members are also part of Blue Ridge Narcotics and Gang Task Force, and another is part of the FBI Safe Streets Taskforce out of Northern Virginia.

CID maintains a working relationship with multiple State, Federal and local task force entities that target specific crimes. Specifically Blue Ridge Gang and Narcotic Task Force, FBI Safe Streets Task Force, FBI Violent Crimes Task Force, Northern Virginia Gang Task Force, US Secret Service Electronic Crimes Task Force, FBI Joint-Terrorism Task Force, Homeland Security Investigations, DEA and the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force. A number of detectives represent Fauquier on each of these respective groups.





Emergency Communications

Communications Highlights:

- 102,607 Calls taken in 2018
- 82,720 Calls for Service for FCSO

The Emergency Communications Division is staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week with a minimum of 4 trained emergency communication specialists per shift. They are responsible for processing, prioritizing and dispatching emergency and non-emergency calls for service. They provide support services to the Fauquier County Sheriff's Office, Warrenton Police Department, Remington Police Department, and the Department of Fire, Rescue and Emergency Management (DFREM), Probation, and Parole, and Social Services.

In 2018, the Communications Division achieved recertification of their National Training Standard Accreditation, from the Association of Public-Safety Communications Officials (APCO). The division continues to work with the Virginia Chapter of National Emergency Number Association (NENA), for which Shift Supervisor Joseph Murphy serves as 2nd Vice President and Shift Supervisor Karen Smallwood holds the Region 2 Representative position. Communications Manager Joell Kight serves as President, and Training Coordinator Allison Marshall serves as Director at Large for the Virginia Chapter of APCO.

Professional Standards



The Professional Standards Division is a very busy and diverse section of the Sheriff's Office. It is comprised of both civilian and sworn personnel, who maintain all records management along with daily data entry, warrants and evidentiary documents to the Commonwealth Attorney's Office and the destruction of records mandated by Virginia Public Records Act.

Training, Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests, accreditation, applicant background checks, organizing special events and projects, are daily activities for this division, along with training and maintaining all Naloxone injectors for sworn employees. The division also has a CPR / First Aid training instructor, an instructor for Crisis Intervention Training, First Aid Mental Health, and a Crime Prevention Specialist to accomplish a wide variety of requests.

Prof. Standard Highlights:

- Accreditation Approval
- CIT and CPR/First Aid Instructors
- Instructed over 465 high school seniors on situational awareness and protection.

Patrol

The Patrol Division protects the citizens of Fauquier County 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The Patrol Division has 54 sworn deputies assigned that work 12 hour rotating shifts. Four squads handle incoming calls for service, and proactively police the Community. Other squads are assigned to Traffic Safety, Animal Control, and School Resource Officers supplement additional specialized staffing needs.

The division is overseen by a Captain, one Lieutenant, and two First Sergeants. Each Patrol squad is led by a Sergeant and Corporal.

Responsibilities of the Patrol Division include but are not limited to, responding to and investigating crimes both current and past-occurrence, suspicious incidents and activity, processing and protecting crime scenes, traffic enforcement and control, along with DUI enforcement, traffic crashes and civil matters. The job of a Patrol deputy is vast and fast moving assignment for the men and women of the Fauquier County Sheriff's Office. Their dedication and perseverance is the heart of the agency.

Patrol Highlights:

- Worked 1,443 Motor Vehicle Crashes
- 3 Certified Commercial Motor Vehicle (CMV) Safety Inspectors

The Traffic Safety Unit has three certified Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Inspectors to promote highway safety through education and enforcement. A portion of their mission is crash data collection, speed studies, and citizen targeted complaints, as well as identifying problematic areas concerning traffic safety. The information can then be utilized to deploy units in the designated areas to reduce dangerous traffic issues.

Patrol

K-9



The Fauquier County Sheriff's Office K-9 Unit consists of six handlers and K-9s. Our K-9s are trained and utilized to detect explosives, narcotics and conduct human tracking. The K-9 Unit is most often deployed to conduct narcotic sniffs of vehicles.

The K-9 Unit has their own training facility in Fauquier County, and put in over 1,000 hours each year. In 2018, the K-9 Unit maintained a vigorous schedule with 36 public demonstrations, 39 agency assists, 42 school sniffs and detected over 1,464 grams of cocaine and 1,460 grams of marijuana.

Bane, Hank, Ex, Zar, Ellie and Katie are a valuable part of the Fauquier Sheriff's Office and get plenty of love and attention from staff.

K-9 Highlights:

- Seized 3149.75grams of illegal drugs
- Conducted 52 Tracks and 145 Vehicle Sniffs
- Taken \$193,216.50 worth of drugs off the streets





Patrol

Animal Control

The Animal Control Unit of the Fauquier County Sheriff's Office, consists of one Sergeant, one Corporal, and two Deputies. All Animal Control officers are law enforcement certified and graduated from the Rappahannock Regional Criminal Justice Academy in specialized Animal Control training. Animal Control deputies supplement the Patrol deputies when additional staffing is needed.


Animal Control Highlights:

- Assisted over 634 domestic and 65 Wildlife animals
- Received 2612 Animal Complaints
- Investigated 233 Animal Bite reports

Deputies assigned to Animal Control respond to a wide variety of animal related calls, including reports of animal cruelty, investigation of alleged abuse or neglect, stray or at-large animals, license violations, animal bites, injured animals, rabies exposures, animal rescue operations, as well as certain calls relating to wild or exotic animals depending on the circumstances.

Animal Control works closely with the Fauquier SPCA staff on a day to day basis to ensure that any animals that are picked up are properly cared for and returned to their proper owners if possible. The Animal Control Center is located at the SPCA in a different building to ensure that animals on quarantine or that have been deemed dangerous are kept separate from the public and any animals up for adaption.

The Fauquier County Sheriff's Office Animal Control Unit has picked up and reunited numerous pets with their owners as well as rescued many animals from dire situations.

Patrol



School Resource Officers (SRO)

The School Resource Officer (SRO) Unit in Fauquier County was established in 1994 with the first two deputies being placed in the two existing high schools. The program was well received and has now expanded to eleven deputies assigned to all three high schools, all middle schools, and two elementary schools.

The SRO program is a community policing based approach practiced in the school environment. They are more than law enforcement on campus, they fulfill many roles within the school community.




SRO Highlights:

The SRO acts as a law related presenter. The SRO shares law enforcement expertise through presentations in the classroom to promote a better understanding of our laws and legal system. All SRO’s in Fauquier County have been certified to teach by the Department of Criminal Justice Services. The SRO also provides legal resource guidance to students, parents, teachers, staff, and acts as a link to support services both inside and outside the schools.

If you ask an SRO, they will tell you the most rewarding part of their job is interacting with the students on a daily basis. When the students get to know and trust the SRO, that partnership is what makes the SRO program work.

Specialties



Sheriff's Emergency Response Team (SERT)

The Sheriff's Emergency Response Team, also known as SERT, is comprised of 13 deputies who are tactically trained, specially equipped and highly disciplined. Their purpose is to provide the tactical response necessary to safely diffuse high-risk or threat situations, such as barricaded subjects, high-risk search warrants, active shooters and dignitary protection.

Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS)

The Fauquier Sheriff's UAS teams primary responsibility is to provide an aerial observation perspective to increase the safety of the public and Sheriff's Office personnel. The team currently has five pilots that have completed 40 hours of pilot instruction and 24 hours of ground course instruction prior to testing and receiving their Federal Aviation Administration Part 107 Remote Pilot Certification. The UAS team is a voluntary assignment made up of both sworn and civilian FCSO personnel and five aircraft. The team was utilized 12 times in 2018 for missing and endangered persons, traffic crash reconstruction and search warrant over watch.



Crisis Negotiations Team (CNT)



The CNT Team was established in 2018 for high risk incidents, such as hostage or barricade situations. CNT's mission is to ensure the safest possible resolution of high-risk law enforcement situations through negotiations and mediation procedures. The team consists of 12 deputies and support staff who have completed negotiator training with the FBI and regional academies. The team was activated 3 times in 2018.

Motor Carrier Safety Investigators

The Sheriff's Office has 4 Federal Motor Carrier Safety Investigators with the agency who make frequent roadside safety checks and post crash inspections of commercial motor vehicles (CMV). Fauquier County MCS Investigators work closely with other Northern Virginia Motor Carrier Inspectors, where they can share information, train and share techniques. Inspectors also have the ability to weigh CMVs through the Department of Motor Vehicles.



Total Station

Total Station is a mapping system that takes precise measurements and elevation ratios and transpose the data for a three dimensional recreation of a particular scene. This system is utilized for traffic crashes and crime scene reconstruction and transferred into a 2-scale drawing. FCSO has 7 trained personnel on call to respond to these scenes.



Law Enforcement Post 1077 currently has 12 Explorers. The Explorers are supported by four full-time Sheriff's Office employees who act as advisors and one community volunteer. The post is completely funded by individuals, civic organizations and businesses within the county. The donations allowed for the purchase of training and dress uniforms for all participants.



The post has 18 official meetings each year consisting of both business and introductory law enforcement training. Each Explorer is required to complete 50 hours of community service annually, and participate in numerous public service events the Fauquier County Fair, Shop with Cop, Child ID program assistance, traffic control at special events just to name a few. Along with the training and volunteering the Explorers must maintain a "C" average in all school subjects.

In June 2018, the Explorers participated in the second annual four day law enforcement training academy. During the academy they studied crime scene clues, search and rescue and were given the opportunity to participate in a shadowing program which included ride-alongs with deputies and observing the emergency communications center.




FCSO is a member of the Blue Ridge Narcotics & Gang Task Force and works closely with other regional, state and federal law enforcement agencies and task forces. These partnerships strengthen our efforts to combat criminal threats in Fauquier County and throughout the region. FCSO uses the Overdose Detection and Mapping Application Program (ODMAP), which provides near real-time suspected overdose data across jurisdictions to support public safety and public health efforts.

Sheriff's detectives working a local narcotics investigation with the Blue Ridge Narcotics and Gang Task Force seized 1.5 kilograms of cocaine and \$55,000 in the Remington area. The investigation involved an individual transporting a large quantity of cocaine into Fauquier County.


