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Letter From the Sheriff

Sheriff Robert P. Mosier



I am pleased to offer the 2019 Fauquier County Sheriff's Office annual report for your review. This publication gives you a snapshot of the events and operations that the Sheriff's Office undertook last year.

As I reflect upon another year of service as your Sheriff, I am heartened to see the continuation of development of positive community relationships with the Sheriff's Office through programs such as the first Citizens Academy and the first Junior Citizens Academy. Additionally, we addressed issues and spoke to the community through multiple Town Hall meetings, the Sheriff's Advisory Board, Coffee With a Cop program, community discussions and many one-on-one conversations with residents, to name only a few of our initiatives.

It was also a year in which we concentrated on not only being guardians of our community, but also in developing our training methods and encouraging leadership among our sworn and civilian personnel. The development of our personnel as future leaders is absolutely critical to good law enforcement and it starts here with recruitment, selection, training and investment in their growth.

We finalized arrangements with the Institute for Credible Leadership Development and had 26 members of the FCSO sign up initially for the program for the first quarter of 2020. The 187-hour curriculum focuses on character, ethics, team-building, emotional intelligence, relationship building, customer service and leadership. We are the second law enforcement agency in the Commonwealth of Virginia to adopt this nationally recognized program.

Our office continued criminal investigations into drug trafficking organizations and worked closely with community stake holders, which resulted in a collaboration with the Community Services Board (CSB) to offer Medically Assisted Treatment (MAT) in the Fauquier County Adult Detention Center for the first time. The program is aimed at reducing recidivism attributed to opioid addiction.

We pressed forward with traffic safety initiatives, which resulted in focused traffic enforcement in areas where we were able to corroborate reported unsafe vehicle operations. We also expanded safety checks of commercial motor vehicles on Fauquier County roads.



In Memory of Our Fallen

Sergeant Charles Ebert Murray, Jr.

End of Watch: Monday, July 9, 1990

Sergeant Charles Murray was killed when his unmarked patrol car was struck by an Amtrak passenger train at an ungated crossing on Eustace Rd. He was enroute to serve a warrant at the time of the crash.

Sergeant Murray had served with the Fauquier County Sheriff's Office for 10 years. He was survived by his wife, parents, and sister.



Deputy Sheriff John Henry Walter

End of Watch: Wednesday, July 5, 1972

Deputy Sheriff John Henry Walter was killed in an automobile accident while enroute to Richmond, Virginia, with another deputy. The other deputy attempted to pass a vehicle on Route 17 and struck another vehicle head-on, killing Deputy Walter instantly. The deputy's vision was obstructed at the time because of heavy rain.



Sergeant John Holcombe Woodson


End of Watch: Monday, August 5, 1946

Sergeant John Holcombe Woodson was shot and killed in Catlett, Virginia, as he and another railroad detective approached a man to question him about freight thefts. Before the detectives even spoke to the man, he produced a .22 caliber handgun and opened fire. One of the shots struck Sergeant Woodson in the neck, mortally wounding him. He was transported to Warrenton Hospital where he succumbed to the wound. The suspect fled but was later arrested. He was subsequently convicted of murder and executed. Sergeant Woodson had served with the Southern Railroad Police Department for 31 years. He was survived by his wife.





The Fauquier County Sheriff’s Office had the honor of hosting the Annual Memorial Service on May 15, 2019, recognizing fallen local law enforcement officers. Members from the Fauquier County Sheriff’s Office, Warrenton Police Department, Board of Supervisors and the Warrenton Town Council gathered to remember the services of those fallen and extend gratitude to their families.





Adult Detention Center

The Fauquier County Adult Detention Center (ADC) is responsible for the safe and secure housing of all individuals incarcerated by the respective courts of Fauquier County. During the 2019 calendar year, the ADC maintained an average daily population of 82 people.



The ADC currently consists of 29 sworn deputy sheriffs, two full-time and one part-time nurse, two kitchen managers and one administrative associate. We remain affiliated with the Northwestern Regional Adult Detention Center (NRADC) in Winchester, VA, where local inmates are also housed to decrease overcrowding.

The ADC continues to hold unconditional certification through the Virginia Department of Corrections Office of Compliance and Accreditation. During the spring of 2019, we received a 100% compliance rating during our tri-annual audit by the VADOC.

In 2019, the Rappahannock/Rapidan Community Services Board (RRCSB) received state funding to provide mental health services to inmates in our facility. This is a newly launched pilot program and the Fauquier ADC is only one of two facilities in the Commonwealth of Virginia to be chosen for participation.

RRCSB is currently providing two full-time, on-site mental health clinicians who will be focused on helping inmates with on-going mental health therapy, chemical addiction and other undiagnosed mental illnesses, as well as working with the Regional Community Services Board to assist individuals who are released from custody and require continued treatment.

In the near future, these clinicians will also begin coordinating without contracted physicians, as well as "Spiritworks" to implement medically assisted substance abuse treatment to eligible inmates who successfully complete our narcotics recovery program. Similar programs have enjoyed success in other regions and it is our hope that this service will provide one more avenue for successful recovery for individuals struggling with opioid and other chemical addictions thus helping reduce relapses and recidivism.



Court Security & Civil Process



The Civil Process/Court Security Division maintains responsibilities for the execution and service of legal documents, warrant services, fugitive apprehension and for the security and operations of three courthouses. The division has a staff of 26 full-time deputies, two part-time deputies, and two administrative associates.



Criminal Investigations



The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is responsible for investigating major crimes, specializing in violent crimes, crimes against persons/children, property crimes, homicides, fire investigations, serious misdemeanor crimes and any other offenses as needed. CID provides investigative support and guidance to other divisions within the office as well as to partner agencies. In 2019, detectives worked 744 cases.



CID houses one of two Crime Analysts who is responsible for information sharing and intelligence gathering. Over this past year our analyst has played a critical role in the success of our division.

Two detectives are dedicated to a Special Operations Unit (SOU) within CID that handle narcotic and gang investigations targeting ongoing criminal activity. One of those detectives is a K-9 handler and team leader for the regional taskforce. SOU members are also part of The Virginia State Police Blue Ridge Narcotics and Gang Taskforce.

CID maintains a working partnership with multiple State, Federal, and local task force entities that target specific crimes. These taskforces have provided vast resources and expertise regarding a number of significant investigations over this past year. A number of detectives represent Fauquier County on each of the respective groups.

In 2019, CID created a violent crimes unit (VCU) consisting of three detectives who will focus on violent crimes and all open homicides to include cold cases. One of the detectives assigned to this unit is a member of the FBI Safe Streets taskforce for the Northern Virginia region.





Emergency Communications

The Emergency Communications Division is staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week with a minimum of four trained emergency communications specialists (ECS). They are responsible for processing, prioritizing and dispatching emergency and non-emergency calls for service. They provide support services to Fauquier County Sheriff's Office, Warrenton Police Department, Remington Police Department, Fauquier Fire and Rescue, Probation and Parole, and Social Services.



This year marks the 25th Anniversary of the Joint Communications Center. The first 9-1-1 call was received in the Joint Center on December 31, 1994 with a report of cows in the road in Remington.

Work continues to implement "Text-to-911" service which will allow citizens to send text messages from wireless devices to the Joint Communications Center and the "Next Generation 911" system will replace existing services with IP internet-based systems.

Patrol



The Patrol Division protects and serves the citizens of Fauquier County 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The Patrol Division has four squads that work 12 hour shifts. These squads handle incoming calls for service and proactively police the community. The Patrol Division also has a Traffic Safety Unit, Animal Control Unit and School Resource Officer (SRO) section that supplement additional specialized staffing needs. The division is overseen by a captain, two lieutenants, and two first sergeants. Each patrol squad is led by a sergeant and corporal.

Responsibilities of the Patrol Division
Include, but are not limited to:

- Responding to and investigating crimes, both current and past occurred
- Responding to suspicious incidents and activity
- Processing and protecting crime scenes
- Traffic/speed enforcement and control
- DUI enforcement
- Investigating traffic crashes

Patrol K-9 Unit



The Fauquier County Sheriff's Office K-9 Unit consists of five handlers and canines. Our K-9 units are trained and utilized to detect explosives, narcotics and to conduct human tracking. The K-9 Unit is most often deployed to conduct narcotic sniffs of vehicles. Team members put in over 1,000 training hours each year and maintain a vigorous schedule. In 2019, the K-9 unit seized \$196,571.30 worth of illegal narcotics. K-9s Bane, Duco, Hank, Katie and Ladee are valuable assets to this agency.

Patrol



Animal Control Unit

The Animal Control Unit of the Fauquier County Sheriff's Office consists of one sergeant, one corporal, and two deputies. All Animal Control deputies are law enforcement certified, but have additional specialized animal control training, a certification earned through the Rappahannock Regional Criminal Justice Academy. These deputies are able to supplement the patrol deputies when extra resources are needed.

By The Numbers-

- Received 2831 animal complaint calls
- Investigated 270 animal bite reports
- Picked up 417 animals



Deputies assigned to animal control respond to a wide variety of animal related calls, including reports of animal cruelty and neglect, investigation of alleged abuse and neglect, stray or at-large animals, license violations, animal bites, injured animals, rabies exposures, animal rescue operations as well as calls related to wildlife and exotic animals depending on the circumstances. Numerous pets have been reunited with their owners due to the hard work of these deputies.



Patrol

School Resource Officers (SRO)




The School Resource Officer (SRO) Unit was established in 1994 with the first two deputies being placed in the two existing high schools. The program was well-received and has since grown to include 11 deputies assigned to all three high schools, all middle schools and two elementary schools.

The SRO program is a community policing based approach practiced in the school environment. They are more than just a law enforcement presence on the school campuses, they fulfill many roles within the school community. All SRO's in Fauquier County have been certified to teach by the Department of Criminal Justice Services. SRO's act as law related presenters and share their expertise through presentations in the classroom to promote better understanding of laws and the legal system. They are able to provide legal resource guidance to students, parents, teachers, faculty and they act as a link to support services both inside and outside the schools.



Beyond their roles within the schools, the School Resource Officers support community engagement throughout the year. It is quite common to see the SROs at community functions such as Warrenton Town Limits, the Warrenton Christmas Parade, Shop With A Cop, National Night Out, festivals, fairs and many other events. Their dedication to community policing and engagement is a significant aspect of the Sheriff's Office mission.





Professional Standards



The Professional Standards Division is a very busy and diverse section of the Sheriff's Office. It is comprised of both civilian and sworn personnel and they have a variety of duties and responsibilities.



Captain Ray Acors

In 2019 the Professional Standards Division consisted of the following staff:

Captain – Responsible for Professional Standards and Communications Division. In addition to his regular duties, he implemented and is a presenter for the HIPS Program, and is Commander of the UAS Team.

Lieutenant/Accreditation Manager – Performs inspections in accordance with accreditation and performs the initial background checks for employee and intern applicants and is a range instructor. Composed and/or revised 17 directives for the year.

Training Officer - Enrolled and monitored the status of deputies enrolled in RRCJA to include three in LE Basic, five in Jail Basic and four in Court Security/Civil Process school. The Training Section hosted 13 classes this year. They also performed seven Safety and Security Assessments for local private schools, libraries and churches.



Sergeant – In addition to his role as the Public Information Officer (PIO), he is the coordinator for security details.

Detective and Evidence Technician - Responsible for recording evidence, submissions to VDFS for examination, providing it for court proceedings and eventual destruction. Personnel are also responsible for the impound lot which is currently storing nine vehicles and a motorcycle at the time of this publication. In 2019, four accreditation inspections occurred and personnel maintained 100% compliance for each inspection.

The Records Manager and Records Technicians are responsible for the following: producing and publishing the Daily Activity Report (DAR), the destruction of records mandated by The Virginia Public Records Act, IBR compliance and VSP monthly submission, monthly Use of Force report submissions, validation of VCIN files, assisting with accreditation inspections and SPOCs, completing surveys, conducting local background checks, processing expungements, tracking and maintaining internal affairs and citizen complaint data and processing FOIA requests.



Specialties



Sheriff's Emergency Response Team (SERT)

The Sheriff's Emergency Response Team, also known as SERT, is comprised of nine deputies who are tactically trained, specially equipped and highly disciplined. Their purpose is to provide the tactical response necessary to safely diffuse high-risk or threat situations, such as barricaded subjects, high-risk search warrants, active shooters and dignitary protection.

Bike Team

The Sheriff's Office Bike Team was established in 2019 with four certified members. The Bike Team is a unique resource that can enhance community policing, add a police presence on walking/nature trails within the county, and allow for greater mobility when responding to certain types of calls.



Total Station

Total Station is a mapping system that takes precise measurements and elevation ratios and transposes the data for a three dimensional re-creation of a particular scene. This system is utilized for traffic crashes and crime scene reconstruction and transferred into a two-scale drawing. FCSO has seven trained personnel on call to respond to these scenes.

Motor Carrier Safety Investigators

The Sheriff's Office has four motor carrier safety investigators with the agency who make frequent roadside safety checks and conduct post crash inspections of commercial motor vehicles (CMV). These deputies work closely with other Northern Virginia Motor Carrier Safety Inspectors, where they can share information, train and share techniques. They also have the ability to weigh CMVs through the Department of Motor Vehicles.





Specialties



Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS)

The Sheriff's UAS teams primary responsibility is to provide an aerial observation perspective to increase the safety of the public and Sheriff's Office personnel. The team currently has five pilots that have completed 40 hours of pilot instruction and 24 hours of ground course instruction prior to testing and receiving their Federal Aviation Administration Part 107 Remote Pilot Certification. The UAS team is a voluntary assignment made up of both sworn and civilian FCSO personnel and five aircrafts. The team was utilized 26 times in 2019 for missing and endangered persons, traffic crash reconstruction and search warrant over watch.

Crisis Negotiations Team (CNT)

The CNT Team was established in 2018 for high risk incidents, such as hostage or barricade situations. CNT's mission is to ensure the safest possible resolution of high-risk law enforcement situations through negotiations and mediation procedures. The team consists of 12 deputies and support staff who have completed negotiator training with the FBI and regional academies. The team was activated 4 times in 2019.



Civil Disturbance Unit (CDU)

The Civil Disturbance Unit is designated to provide an organized and disciplined response to civil disorder, crowd control or other tactical situations. The unit consists of 17 members from all divisions, and have been trained to act as a single platoon or operate as individual five person squads.



Administrative Support



The backbone of the Sheriff's Office begins and ends with the Administrative Staff. Each division is assigned personnel to assist both the public and sworn personnel, in maintaining, organizing and recording necessary documentation to meet local, state and federal regulations. This dedicated staff of support is versatile and can assist in any division in any capacity necessary to get the job done.


Citizens Academy & Junior Academy



Fauquier County Sheriff's Office hosted their first Citizen's Academy in 2019. 18 eligible citizens started the academy at the beginning of June and graduated on July 30th. Each Tuesday evening during the session, participants gathered at the Sheriff's Office to share a meal together donated by local businesses and network through meaningful discussions. Each week, the program provided an overview of the Sheriff's Office to include presentations, demonstrations and tours of the various areas of responsibility. A range of topics included the role of the Sheriff's Office with an overview of the criminal justice system in Virginia, specifically in Fauquier County.



The Citizens Academy experience was documented weekly through videography and production by Leland Schwartz with Fauquier Channel One. During the final week of Citizens Academy, a Completion Ceremony was held at Fauquier High School for the participants and their families. Sheriff Mosier recognized the dedication and commitment of the Citizens Academy members for completing the course and gaining a better understanding and appreciation of the duties of the Sheriff's Office.



In June of 2019, Fauquier County Sheriff's Office also hosted the first Junior Academy. Cadets learned about law enforcement, and the role of the Sheriff's Office within the community. Five of the explorers from Explorer Post 1077 were squad leaders for the Junior Academy, displaying excellent leadership.





Community Services

Explorer Post 1077



Law Enforcement Post 1077 currently has 12 explorers. The Explorers are supported by four full-time Sheriff's Office employees who act as advisors and one community volunteer. The post is completely funded by individuals, civic organizations and businesses within the county. The donations allow for the purchase of training and dress uniforms for each explorer.

The post has 18 official meetings each year consisting of both business and introductory law enforcement training. Each explorer is required to complete 50 hours of community service annually, and participate in numerous public service events such as Shop With A Cop, Child ID program assistant, and traffic control at special events. Along with the training and volunteering, explorers must maintain a "C" average in school.

Shop With A Cop



Fauquier Cops for Children (FCFC) is organized by volunteers from the law enforcement community to provide assistance and support to the youth of Fauquier County. Made up of Fauquier County Sheriff's Deputies, Officers from the Warrenton Police Department, Virginia State Troopers, Fauquier County Office of the Commonwealth's Attorney, and Fauquier County Department of Social Services, the FCFC Shop-With-A-Cop program's primary goal is to provide an opportunity for a better Christmas for Fauquier children and teens who have been adversely affected by crime, abuse or other situations which required law enforcement action. FCFC is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization.
